
Camp Salesian Report 2023




Additional Information About Our Campers

Participants by Grades




Note: Upper Grades (4th-8th grades) were 58.9% of our participants this year and 7th/8th grade girls was the largest grade making up 15.9% of our participants in our camp.

Note: For lower grades the numbers between genders was very close with only a little difference, while in the upper grades the girls are about 10 more than the boys. This reflects 7th/8th grade girls being the largest grade.

Notes:


- So many of our campers live around the club and some even walk every morning or afternoon.

Counselors are the young people who volunteered at the club. These young people do not get paid for their commitment.


1. Total Number of Counselors attending camp: 109 volunteers.
2. We had 21 staff overseeing the camp totalling staff & volunteers at 130.
3. We had 61 male volunteers and 48 female volunteers.

Counselors by Gender




Note: Our counselors this year saw more amount of male volunteers, compared to the other years where it's pretty even between genders.

School System of Counselors




Note: The majority of our counselors come from the public school system! The next large majority of our students are in a community college or 4-year university. Those together make up almost 80% of the counselors. We have a small amount that come from private or charter schools.

Note: We had a retention of 56 counselors this year, which made up 52% of our counselors. This year we had 15 volunteers that were campers and came back to be counselors. This shows that our campers want to give back and be counselors just like the mentors they had.
